As of March 2010, the LFF has a little over £2,900 in the bank, £1,600 of which is the remaining balance in the £2,500 donation from Interaction, for long-term support of the fan funds.

In total, we took £600 at the auction at Eastercon 2009 and £150 at Novacon 2009. We've paid out £185 to TAFF and £200 to GUFF.

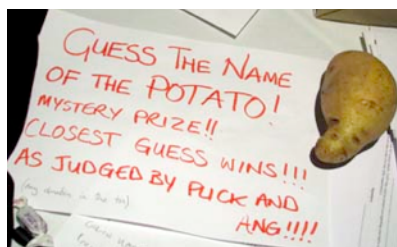

Potato!

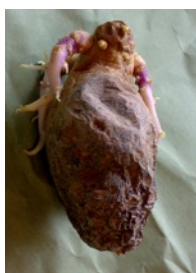
